Jewish Hope

In "An Essay on Man," Alexander Pope (1733-1734) wrote, "Hope springs eternal." Though not a Jewish source, Pope's memorable verse describes what remains after angst, suffering, and loss. Hope springs eternal because it's the sliver of opportunity that enables us to reach out, to get up, and to "Choose Life," as Torah requires us to do.

In the New Year 5784, we anticipate a sweet year after ten days of repentance and introspection. This scared endeavor begins and ends with expectations for forgiveness and renewal. No one should fear retribution or condemnation even if one's guilt or transgressions are great. The opportunity for forgiveness, symbolized by the Gates of Repentance, is always open to us. Even one good deed, in the name of repentance, tips the proverbial scale of justice and mercy in our favor. Therefore, hope springs eternal, because it's consistent with our faith that the gift of life is not for naught. During the course of our life we have time to sort out our goals, to repair our faults, and to serve well.

For those who despair, hope remains after everything else is gone. A synagogue member who had been both broke and poor told me that there's a difference between them. Being poor, he said, is a state of mind and circumstances that can be difficult to overcome; but being broke is an episode in one's life that can be overcome with tenacity, resilience, and hope. Even those who are poor are not without hope that comes from a generous community and helping hands. In the hospital where the sickest patients wait for relief, I have told family members that there's always hope. Even when death is near and we have to prepare ourselves, hope remains until life is no more. As long as we live, therefore, we "Choose life."

The Jewish New Year is our sacred season to renew our commitment to Judaism's highest values for integrity, justice, and equity. When we succeed in this regard, we can know that we met the high standards of our tradition. And when we stumble or fail, we can try again with lessons learned and undiminished hope. That's life. There's no giving up; there's only the cycle of human attempts to learn from wells of truth and wisdom, and to do the best that we can.

In Judaism, we raise a cup of wine, a symbol of joy and sweetness, to proclaim "L'chayyim!" To life! We don't proclaim suffering or despair. There is no virtue in suffering or poverty; we can learn from it, but we don't aim for it. To be blessed is to know prosperity and to be generous to the synagogue and community. In the New Year, hope springs eternal because it's inextricably linked to our Jewish outlook on life. With hopefulness, we strive for a good life, well-lived, according to Torah, truth, and mitzvot.

From my family to yours, may the New Year 5784 be a year of prosperity, good health, hope, and peace.

The month of Elul is a time of reflection and preparation for the Jewish New Year and Days of Awe. We are tasked with doing the spiritual work of getting ready to face God with an open heart. But how are we supposed to work through such a large concept?



Imagine that your

soul is like a tapestry, full of intricacies and colors. Imagine a tear in it, caused by something you did that you continue to feel bad about. How big is the tear? What damage has that tear done to the tapestry? As you ask for forgiveness from others and grant forgiveness to yourself, imagine that this tear is repairing itself slowly, little by little, and your tapestry (your soul) is whole again. What does it look like now? How do you feel now?

Please join us in person for an evening session on Wednesday, September 13 at 7:00 P.M., where we'll discuss the Mussar process of cheshbon hanefesh (soul accounting). Together we will think about the times we may have missed the mark or been less than the person we most wish to be. Elul is an opportunity for transformation and renewal, of love and caring. We will guide you in gently looking at yourself with compassion and forgiveness while creating a pathway back to your higher self.

MEMORIAL TREES AT BETH ISRAEL MEMORIAL GARDEN ON ANTOINE



Congregation Beth Israel is pleased to announce the installation of two Memorial Tree art sculptures by Bob Dyer in the Donor Plaza at Beth Israel Memorial Garden on Antoine. These trees, constructed of iron, stand 12 feet tall, 12 feet wide, and are designed to survive any inclement weather. The trees will hold 700 custom metal leaves that are intended to be engraved in the memory of loved ones.

The trees serve as a beautiful way to visit and remember loved ones, especially those who are resting elsewhere. Leaves may be purchased using the form found online.

Orders for leaves will be filled twice each year, during High Holy Day season (they will not be ready in time for the High Holy Days 2023/5784) and in the Spring for Tu Bishvat, or Jewish Arbor Day.

Each leaf can be inscribed on the front side or both the front and back side. The front side will have the loved one's name/birthdate/death date. The back side may either have the same information as the front side, or alternatively may be inscribed with the name(s) of those remembering the loved one.

Our 2023-24 Miriam Browning Jewish Learning Center held its Opening Day on Sunday morning, August 27th. Hundreds of children, parents, and Teen Madrichim joined our Clergy, MBJLC Faculty and Staff for a wonderful morning as they met their new educators, learned more about our upcoming year, and celebrated in a concert featuring Jay Rapoport, Director of the URJ 6 Points Creative Arts Academy.

While the children were getting to know their new faculty and Teen Madrichim in various areas all around the Temple, our clergy, staff, and MBJLC Committee members met with all the parents. New initiatives were discussed, including an expansion of last year's successful Tiyulim program, which included taking children on field trips to various locations all over the city on Sunday mornings. These programs have been made possible by a generous grant from the MBJLC Community Engagement Fund of Congregation Beth Israel. In addition to family education initiatives for every grade level where parents and children come together for meaningful sessions, we will now be adding more grade levels so more children can attend our Tiyulim field trips. In addition, we will also be expanding our programming to include Mitzvah Mavens, a Mitzvah-based curriculum that will enable all MBJLC children to engage in mitzvah projects offsite during the year.

It was also an exciting opportunity to share our new vision for Kehillah 7, a community-

wide program open only to 7th graders. Three times during the year, all 7th graders in Houston will meet together at Congregation Beth Israel, Congregation Beth Yeshurun, and at Congregation Brith Shalom for programming. These opportunities will allow all the 7th graders to socialize and learn together, as they prepare to join Kehillah High starting in 8th grade.

Hebrew learning is still our focus, especially on Wednesday and Thursday afternoons, as 3rd-6th graders learn Hebrew together, focusing mainly on our liturgical prayers, as they prepare to become B'nei Mitzvah. Wednesday sessions are held in person at Temple, and Thursday sessions will continue to be held online via Zoom.

Kehillah High registration is now open for our 9th year. Kehillah High is our post-B'nei Mitzvah program that was founded in 2015. Teens from

Congregation Beth Israel, Congregation Beth Yeshurun, and Congregation Brith Shalom are engaged throughout the year as we develop the next generation of Jewish leaders in our community. Kehillah High has successfully grown to serve close to 160 Jewish teens each year from a diverse set of private and public schools and across a wide geography of 26 zip codes. Kehillah High leverages a proven model of inclusive Jewish learning, communitybased service projects, and immersive Jewish travel experiences, including grade-level trips and a biennial Israel trip. This past summer the Jewish Federation of Greater Houston created a new staff position, Director of Teen Education and Engagement, which now bring Kehillah High under the Federation's umbrella of programming and is led by Danielle Alexander, Founding Director, to this groundbreaking position. Danielle will continue as Director of the program and will lead the Federation in the teen space in partnership with our MBJLC staff.

Rabbi David Lyon, along with Rabbi Brian Strauss of Beth Yeshurun and Rabbi Ranon Teller of Brith Shalom celebrate this transition with Danielle, Kehillah High's leadership council and all educators and supporters. Regarding Kehillah High, he commented that "all the students know their own rabbis, but now they know rabbis, cantors, educators and Jewish professionals across the Houston Jewish community. By becoming an integral and noted educational arm of the Houston Jewish Federation, it shows us Kehillah High is here to stay, here to grow, and here to assure Jewish students and their parents that Houston's Jewish community has means of Jewish identification for everyone."





The Still, Small Voice is a quarterly column that will appear in each issue of the Temple Bulletin. Written by Dr. Tom Cole, Director of the Center for Spiritual Direction it will address specific issues embedded in the spiritual life of Reform Judaism and of Congregation Beth Israel.

"SILENCE IS PRAISE TO YOU, O GOD" - PSALM 65:2

Why is it so hard to be quiet today?

For one thing, we are drowning in noise-the sounds of traffic; 24-hour news cycles and advertisements on screens everywhere we look; innumerable phone calls and conversations that command our attention at work and at home; addictive cell phones, ipads and the ever-present internet which never shuts down.

For another thing, we are afraid of silence, which might confront us with our anxiety or our emptiness. And then there are always those internal voices telling us that we haven't done enough, or we aren't good enough, or that we need to work harder, get stronger, look more attractive.

Often, we lack the ability to be silent. We don't meditate. We don't have the tools or habits to dip into the deep well of silence where we might hear the whisper of God's love, or feel our aloneness, or truly listen to another, or perhaps travel to the mystical depth of pure awareness.

And yet moments of silence are all around us. We might be "struck speechless" by a moment of beauty; or "tongue-tied"; we might say that "words cannot express" our gratitude; a piece of music might "take our breath away" or contain silent spaces between notes that invite deeper listening. We are asked to "take a moment of silence"

in a Sabbath service. We may feel swept up by a "whirlwind", overwhelmed by a religious experience we cannot give words to. We may "have no words" looking at a newborn child or looking at the body of a person who has died.

One way to become more familiar with silence is to practice paying attention. Listen for silence. Listen to silence. Listen in silence. Internal or external. Alone or in a group. Consider joining Beth Israel's Saturday morning meditation group led by Dr. Jay Tarnow and David Scott.

Spirituality dwells in silence. Silence is an accomplishment. We must listen silently with intention and awareness. When we listen in silence, we may hear the song of a sparrow, or the rustle of the wind, the voice of a relative who is not present, someone who has passed over into the next world. We may hear a "still, small, voice," the voice of God. After all, the watchword of our faith requires us to listen: "Hear O Israel, the Lord is Our God, the Lord is One." "still, small, voice," the voice of God.
